SERVICE, SACRIFICE AND A SOLDIER BEAR NAMED WINNIE

THE STORY

With a script crafted by Dr. Carol Beynon and Mark Payne, the incredible artistry of HOP Multimedia Studios, and based on research gathered from Canadian military history, this presentation pays tribute in story and song to the courage and sacrifice of the more than 600,000 Canadian soldiers who have died in wars to protect our freedom. This story recounts vignettes of Canada's participation in World War I through the eyes of a father and child.

When the Great War broke out in 1914 only 50 years had passed since Confederation, and Canada as a nation, was in its infancy – a vast country with only 8 million people spread across 10 million km. And yet 7% of the population served the war effort in some form or another. Our Canadian military made a significant difference in the outcome of the War.

Today, we meet Major Harry Colbourne, a veterinarian from Winnipeg, who was conscripted at the age of 27 to care for the army's thousands of horses shipped overseas to war. On his journey to the front, Harry happened upon and adopted an orphan bear cub that he named Winnipeg Bear, or Winnie, for short. Winnie's travels took her from her birthplace near White River, Ontario to the Valcartier Training Camp in Quebec, across the Atlantic Ocean to the training camp on the Salisbury Plain in England and finally to the London Zoological Society. Winnie's escapades provided a wonderful source of morale for her regiment during training.

Service, Sacrifice and a Soldier Bear Named Winnie shows how Winnie helped the people, especially the children of London experience some comfort during and after the war, and how she supported the wounded veterans in mind and body who returned home damaged after the war was over.

It is after the war that she meets a little boy named Christopher Robin Milne, who immortalized our favourite bear as Winnie-the-Pooh. A.A. Milne's stories of the *Hundred Acre Wood* reflect deeper meanings than simple children's stories. Milne returned from the war suffering from PTSD and these stories had multiple meanings – providing a sense of safety and security for his young son, some therapeutic value from the horrific experiences of war, and as a subtle anti-war message.

ARTISTIC STAFF: AMABILE BOYS & MEN'S CHOIRS



Dr Carol Beynon is the founding co-artistic director of the Amabile Boys & Men's Choirs of London, Canada and Professor emerita at the University of Western Ontario. At Western, she served as Associate Vice Provost of the School of Graduate & Postdoctoral Studies, Dean of the Faculty of Education (Acting), and professor in choral music education. With the Amabile Boys & Men's Choirs, she has conducted invited and reviewed performances and recordings for the International Choral Federation's World Symposium VI, the

American Choral Directors' Association (Los Angeles), Choral Canada, and the International Society for Music Education with broadcasts on CBC, BBC, Minnesota Public Radio, Bravo TV and Czech National TV. The Men's Choirs are most recent winners of national choral competitions sponsored by Choral Canada. Carol's research focuses on intergenerational learning through singing, the impact of singing on people with Alzheimer's Disease, and gender issues in music education; she is the first author of the book *Learning to Teach* published by Pearson Canada (2001) and co-editor of *Critical Perspectives in Canadian Music Education* (2012). She has received several awards for outstanding teaching from the University Student Council and in 2007 was named the Woman of Excellence in Arts, Culture and Heritage in London, Ontario and community. In 2010, Carol was inducted into the "Wall of Fame" at the Don Wright Faculty of Music at the University of Western Ontario.



With a career spanning more than 25 years, Mark is at home performing in every musical genre. He has performed with orchestras and opera companies across Canada as conductor, pianist, singer, repetiteur, and chorus master. Currently, Mark is the resident Music Director for the Victoria Playhouse Petrolia, co-conductor of Primus: the Amabile Men's Choir, director and keyboards with True North Music, and CEO of HOP Studios. As a performer, his critically acclaimed one-man shows, "Simply Grand" and "I Love A

Piano" have played consistently to sold out audiences. The depth of his abilities as a tenor soloist and musician – (piano, keyboards, accordion, harmonica, guitar, trumpet) enhances the depth of his abilities as a music director, arranger, conductor, opera vocal coach, and adjudicator. His uncanny ability to effortlessly adapt to different genres of music and styles, ranging from Broadway to classical to country to rock to jazz standards has afforded him the myriad of opportunities he has enjoyed throughout his career. Mark has performed great piano works, including Rachmaninoff's 2nd piano concerto, Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, and Beethoven's 1st Piano Concerto with several professional orchestras. In addition, he has worked with major north American opera houses (San Francisco Opera, Pacific Opera Victoria, Calgary, City Opera) as vocal coach, conductor and repetiteur. About the Amabile Boys & Men's Choirs

The Amabile Boys & Men's Choirs, founded in 1990, draw singers from across southwestern Ontario and provide musical experiences of the highest level for male singers in the region. The focus is on character development and mentorship through singing and artistic excellence. There are 4 choirs in the Amabile Boys & Men's Choirs, ranging from the Training Choir through to the adult men's choir. Trebles whose voices change have immediate access to the tenor-bass youth choir and opportunities to continue their vocal and musical education. The choirs are champions of music by Canadian composers and commission new pieces annually.

The focus of the <u>Amabile Treble Training Choir</u> (TTC) under the direction of John Vermue and Lydia Kendell is on learning to sing and play together as an ensemble as the boys gain experience singing and performing, while learning proper vocal technique, posture, breathing, tone production, how to read music, and basic music theory. They also study recorders with Rosemary Bannerman to support music literacy development. The TTC performs as part of our regular concert series and is often invited to perform for benefit concerts in the area.

Experienced singers with unchanged voices, ranging from 10 to 15 years old, are invited to become members of the <u>Amabile Treble Concert Choir</u> (TCC). Mentored by the Amabile Young Men's Ensemble, and conducted by Amabile alumni, **Jeff Beynon and Don Sills**, the program consists of rehearsals and performances of the traditional boychoir repertoire and Grade 1 Theory & Rudiments. As well as singing on world stages, they have been guest performers with the Toronto International Film Festival, Orchestra London, the Windsor Symphony, and the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony. The choir has performed for such notable persons as Bishop Desmond Tutu and the Prime Minister of Canada, and has toured extensively over the years to Europe, Caribbean, and across Canada.



The <u>Amabile Young Men's Ensemble</u> (AYME) is made up of young men with changing voices up to the age of 19 under the direction of <u>Jeff Beynon</u>, <u>Don Sills</u>, <u>Carol Beynon and Mark Payne</u>. The AYME focuses on healthy vocal development during the changing voice period, and the young men are given an introduction to challenging male voice repertoire. The choir performs with, and is mentored by, Primus on a regular basis. Performing locally, nationally and internationally, they have been featured several times on CBC, Radio L'espace, French public television, and Czech Public Radio and were winners of the National Choral Canada Competition for Youth Choirs – Equal Voice Male in 2004, 2008, 2015 and 2017. Senior members of the AYME also sing with the senior members of AYS in the Amabile Chamber Choir.

Primus: Amabile Men's Choir (Primus), conducted by Carol Beynon and Mark Payne, is known for its deeply sonorous and rich sound that rewards listeners with a strong identity without sacrificing the sound of one uniform voice. Formed in the fall of 2000, Primus involves students and professionals in all walks of life who enjoy the pursuit of the choral art and the camaraderie that develops so naturally in male ensembles. The members act as active mentors to the high school choristers and boys in the treble choirs of the Amabile organization. The men also provide leadership development workshops on a regular basis for music educators, university music education classes, and students in schools, promoting the healthy benefits of being a male singer. In its short history, the choir has achieved an international reputation that places it in a leading position in the world of male choral singing. Primus was thrilled to be invited to perform for choral conductors at two of the world's largest conferences, the Sixth World Choral Symposium in Minneapolis (2002) and the national convention of the American Choral Directors Association in Los Angeles (2005). The men have also been honoured to act as choir-in-residence for the 1st World Festival of Singing for Men and Boys in Prague during 2004 and were again invited to co-host the event in the 2008 season. This role provided Primus with the opportunity to showcase a strong Canadian presence on the world stage. The choir has won the National Competition for Canadian Amateur Choirs, Equal Voice Male Category. Locally, Primus has performed with the renowned Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra, Autorickshaw, the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and Orchestra London, and has been invited to perform at several national meetings of Choral Canada. The choir was also featured in the CBC Radio 1 documentary Where Have All the Tenors Gone?

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

Letters for Home Movement 2 – The Trench Peter Meechan

Letters for Home is a three-movement work, specifically concerned with the First World War. Each of the work's movements broadly outlines emotions that would form part of any soldiers lives during any war – and as such, performances of this work can easily be adapted to reflect other wars both modern and historical. (excerpt from the composer's website)

In this show, Encore the Concert Bands, conducted by Gwyn Beynon, plays the second movement, *The Trench*. This music combines bravado in the percussion opening with the whole band coming together as one – as a unit, before again we hear fear and trepidation in the brass, once more failing to reach a resolution. Perhaps the thoughts of the soldier are interrupted as the percussion once more calls the men to arms. The movement ends with several abrupt and loud canon shots in the percussion woven into the magic of video.
